SPEEDWAY AUSTRALIA & FEDERAL GRANT UPDATES

We had an amazing response to our track grant scheme, with 35 venues submitting requests to the value of over \$200,000. This means that not everyone will be successful in a couple of weeks time when we announce which projects we will be able to assist.

Our Sport Development Officers Adam & Ross have been in touch with a number of tracks to point them in the direction of the Federal "Stronger Communities" infrastructure grants programme we mentioned back in Speed eNews #73. We encourage all tracks to contact their local Federal MP and work through the process of applying for this scheme. At the very least it will build your networks with your local representative, which can only provide long run benefits to your entity.

Best of all, the feedback from some MP's we've spoken to is that their inboxes aren't exactly overflowing with applications.

BURNOUTS

With the new season approaching in many parts of the country, this is a friendly reminder that burnouts are a type of motorsport activity sanctioned and licensed by Speedway Australia. If you are conducting burnouts then the relevant Speedway Australia rules and regulations apply, and the event must have the correct permit.

See Section 11 of the July 2019 rulebook for all the details on how burnouts must operate at a Speedway Australia track.



For example, the regular speedway infield area is a no go for anyone other than competitors and officials – just like a normal race meeting.

Its not that long ago that 11 spectators were critically injured at a burnout event in the Northern Territory (not at a speedway track though), and we know that a speedway facility is a great place to ensure crowd and participant safety when compared to non-speedway burnout venues.

The salient point to take away from this update is that burnouts are a legitimate source of enjoyment and income at many tracks, but there are a set of rules and regs that must be adhered to for the benefit of the sport as a whole.
